Project Bandaloop honors nature, community, and the human spirit through dance. The company, under the artistic direction of Amelia Rudolph, creates a blend of dance, sport, ritual, and environmental awareness. Inspired by the possibilities of climbing and rappelling, the choreography draws on aerial, vertical and horizontal movement to craft dances, many site-specific. The work explores the relationship between movement and gravity and stimulates viewers' awareness of their natural and built environments. Project Bandaloop hopes to enrich the quality of life with their performances, outreach and ability to bring dance to new audiences. Since 1996, the company has enjoyed performing for close to half a million people.

Project Bandaloop is supported in the Bay Area by The San Francisco Foundation and The Hewlett Foundation.

Dance Brigade was founded in 1984 by Nina Fichter and Krissy Keefer, original members of Wallflower Order, to create and perform dance theater that addresses the complex problems of contemporary American women. For the past 20 years, the company has created, performed, presented, and produced issue-oriented dance theater exploring socio-political issues such as violence against women, class injustice, war, racism, breast cancer, sexual abuse, and homophobia. The company has created approximately 10 full-length concerts of contemporary dance theater pieces including *The Revolutionary Nutcracker Sweetie, Cinderella: A Tale of Survival, Ballet of the Banshees, Queen of Sheba, CaveWomen,* and most recently, *Spell.* In 1998, under the artistic direction of Krissy Keefer, the company began operating the 140-seat Dance Mission Theater at 24th and Mission Streets in San Francisco, which has evolved into one of the region's leading contemporary dance spaces. At this venue, Dance Brigade produces its original work, conducts a multicultural dance instruction program for youth and adults, and rents space to other companies and choreographers for performances, classes, and rehearsals. At Dance Mission, Dance Brigade also regularly produces the aerial dance festival *SkyDancers: Women who Fly Through the Air.*

Robert Moses' Kin was founded by Robert Moses in 1995, creating numerous works of varying styles and genres for his eclectic dance company. Robert Moses harvests movement to create dances that speak to our times. His work is a powerful combination of athletic technique, rhythmic complexity, a fusion of different dance styles, and gestural detail. He explores topics ranging from oral history in African American culture to the life and work of author James Baldwin, the isolation found in new love, the dark side of contemporary urban culture, and the simple joyous expressions of pure movement. Moses and his company have been honored with many prestigious grants and awards, among these are two Isadora Duncan Dance Awards and the Bonnie Bird North American Choreography Award. Moses has held residencies at ODC Theater, in the San Francisco public schools as part of the San Francisco Arts in Education Foundation Artist-in-Residence Program, and a Duke/Wattis Artist-in-Residence at San Francisco's Yerba Buena Center for the Arts. He has performed with his company at many nationally esteemed venues such as Jacob's Pillow Dance Festival, Colorado Dance Festival, and the Bates Dance Festival. He has created commissioned works for Oakland Ballet, Cincinnati Ballet, Lawrence Pech Dance Company, Robert Henry Johnson Dance Company, Savage Jazz Dance Company, and England's Transitions Dance Company of the Laban Centre. His work has been performed nationally and internationally including England, Italy, and Ireland.

Epiphany Productions was started in 1997 by Artistic Director Kim Epifano and is a performing arts company that erases the traditional boundaries between dance, theater, and music, fusing different genres together in fresh, surprising, innovative ways. On the stage and in the street, Epihany Productions tells stories through movement, sound, and spoken word that inspire contemporary audiences to think in new ways about who we are and where we live. The company's goals are to develop dynamic, cutting-edge work that is accessible and relevant, and to engage diverse communities in the performing arts through performances and workshops. Epifano has taught and performed at numerous festivals and at such universities as UCLA, UCSD, Sonoma State, San Diego State, Mills College, UCSB, Goucher College, as well as UC Davis where she is a current MFA candidate. Her work has been honored by the Isadora Duncan Dance Awards (IZZIES) many times, and she is a recent recipient of a Creative Work Fund Grant to collaborate with Creativity Explored and AXIS Dance Company. She has also been awarded a grant from the San Francisco Arts Commission to create a work entitled *Lotta's Opera* for the centennial of the 1906 earthquake in downtown San Francisco in May of 2006. She continues to tour and teach nationally and internationally.

This piece is dedicated to Carey Davis who loves to sing.


